We are eager to share this with you as we make 'One Book, One School' a yearly tradition here at Auguston! This book was written in 1964 (!!) and is a hugely popular children's story.

'One Book, One School' is a novel program in that children at all grade levels in our school will all be reading the same book at the same time. Strange or daring as that may seem, it makes sound educational sense. Reading material out loud allows children of any reading level to enjoy a story, even if they aren't yet able to independently read it. Exposing our students to chapter books at an early age also helps to develop a lifelong love of reading.

As part of this years 'One Book, One School' program, your family will be asked to read a series of pages every weekday with your child. Don't worry – if weeknights are busy you can easily read multiple chunks in a day, catch up on the weekends or listen along as we post recordings of staff members reading each chapter aloud on our website. We've divided the story up into easily readable chunks of only a few pages each night. We know that some of our students will even be old enough to read them out loud to you. The attached calendar will help you keep pace with the school as we all make our way through the book.

We will celebrate our shared reading with trivia questions, fun classroom chats about what's happening in the book and a fun filled wrap up celebration that includes a movie celebration and dress up day. We hope that students will all feel proud of their accomplishments in reading this entertaining book along with our whole school community!

The 2023 film Wonka is the prequel to the story, depicting Willy Wonka's early days as a chocolatier.
